Parent Training

At the start of June we had another Parents' Training for the parents of the children in our program. We were elated to learn that roughly half the parents began saving and financially planning after the previous training on financial management and that parents also reported trying the new farming techniques learned. This training focused on how to grow cash crops- specifically coffee- and ways to invest. Coffee is a major cash crop in Uganda, so we brought in an expert coffee farmer and seller to help explain how to care for their coffee plants to get the best harvest, and therefore, make the most amount of money. One of the parents said, "Learning how to properly care and prune for coffee plants is going to transform my garden. I didn't know why some challenges were coming, but now I can identify the problems." James Magomu also led the parents through investment strategies. They looked at retirement, investment options achievable in village, as well as non- financial investments (ex. family, friends, fun, etc). James explained the importance of investing in one's children. Parents reported that they had never seen their children as an investment before. At the end of the training, one parent stood up and confessed, "When I learned about family investment, I realized I had never hugged my child. But when I go home right now, I want to start doing it."

Gathering Day

Our monthly Gathering Days for the children are still going strong and are being led by our faithful Teaching Facilitator, Carol. We consistently have between 30-32 of the children in attendance and the children have been very engaged in the Bible lessons. One of their favorite stories has been the the story of Moses. So we surprised them over Easter weekend with a movie showing of the Prince of Egypt! They loved seeing the story! We were unable to find a translated version of the story, so our team was busy helping to explain what was happening, but nonetheless, we all had a great time!

Simon, our Home Visit Facilitator, has continued to check in monthly on YICA Children. He visits their families and sees what is going on in their lives. One major issue that is repeatedly brought up from the home visits is that they have no lunch during school, and it makes it harder for them to focus. If you would like to help do a meal plan for a child (roughly \$5 a month), please send us an email and we would love to help organize that assistance.

Youth Chat

In our Youth Chat program, we have selected members who show potential for leadership and have given them positions called Contact Persons. Their role is to represent YICA in their schools or churches and to help us better reach the youth.


At the start of each month, we meet with them over breakfast to provide a leadership training and let them share their ideas on how to make Youth Chat better. This last training was on Synergy (team work). We learned what team work is, why team work is important and how to use it. We then had them do a team building exercise- the human pretzel! In this exercise, members stand in a circle and randomly grab hands of other members. They then must untangle themselves to make a circle. Though the youth were skeptical it was solvable, they were able to work as a team to untangle themselves and to make a circle!



Mbale Gatherings

Our monthly gatherings are moving along well. We have had 4 meetings so far. The first one was an introduction to who we are as an organization. The second one was led by our Youth Chat Coordinator, Francis Oluka, who taught us about vision and goals. We had small group discussions afterwards to discuss questions about our personal visions, how to reach them, and what will help us remain focused towards them. For our third gathering, we showed them the movie Jesus Revolution. While our fourth meeting was on a hot topic for the youth- dating! Kelsey Magomu led them through the topic and we opened it up for them to ask questions about dating to a panel of married adults.

One new aspect of the program will be the Hangouts! We will be organizing events in the middle of the month for the youth to participate in. The aim of this is to provide a space for us to all get to know each other, have fun and to adventure a bit!
